The Kingdom of God and the Kingdom of Heaven are the Same Thing

- I. The Kingdom of God and the Kingdom of Heaven are the same thing.
 - 1. The phrase "kingdom of heaven" is exclusively used in Matthew's gospel.
 - 2. The phrase "kingdom of God" is used a few times in Matthew and John, and extensively in Mark and Luke.
 - 3. A simple comparison of parallel verses in Matthew, Mark, and Luke show beyond question that the kingdom of heaven and the kingdom of God are interchangeable terms. For example:
 - A. The mystery of the kingdom of heaven/God.
 - i. **Mat 13:11** He answered and said unto them, Because it is given <u>unto you</u> to know the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it is not given.
 - ii. **Mar 4:11** And he said unto them, <u>Unto you it is given to know the mystery</u> <u>of the kingdom of God</u>: but unto them that are without, all these things are done in parables:
 - iii. Luk 8:10 And he said, <u>Unto you it is given to know the mysteries of the kingdom of God</u>: but to others in parables; that seeing they might not see, and hearing they might not understand.
 - B. The parable of the mustard seed.
 - i. **Mat 13:31-32** Another parable put he forth unto them, saying, <u>The kingdom of heaven is like to a grain of mustard seed</u>, which a man took, and sowed in his field: 32) Which indeed is the least of all seeds: but when it is grown, it is the greatest among herbs, and becometh a tree, so that the birds of the air come and lodge in the branches thereof.
 - ii. Mar 4:30-32 And he said, Whereunto shall we liken the kingdom of God? or with what comparison shall we compare it? 31) It is like a grain of mustard seed, which, when it is sown in the earth, is less than all the seeds that be in the earth: 32) But when it is sown, it groweth up, and becometh greater than all herbs, and shooteth out great branches; so that the fowls of the air may lodge under the shadow of it.
 - iii. Luk 13:18-19 Then said he, Unto what is <u>the kingdom of God</u> like? and whereunto shall I resemble it? 19) <u>It is like a grain of mustard seed</u>, which a man took, and cast into his garden; and it grew, and waxed a great tree; and the fowls of the air lodged in the branches of it.
 - C. The parable of the leaven.
 - i. **Mat 13:33** Another parable spake he unto them; <u>The kingdom of heaven is</u> <u>like unto leaven, which a woman took, and hid in three measures of meal, till</u> <u>the whole was leavened.</u>
 - ii. Luk 13:20-21 And again he said, Whereunto shall I liken <u>the kingdom of</u> <u>God</u>? 21) It <u>is like leaven, which a woman took and hid in three measures of</u> <u>meal, till the whole was leavened</u>.
 - 4. Jesus himself used the terms interchangeably.
 - A. Mat 19:23 Then said Jesus unto his disciples, Verily I say unto you, That <u>a rich</u> man shall hardly enter into the kingdom of heaven.
 - B. Mat 19:24 <u>And again I say unto you, It is easier for a camel to go through the eye</u> of a needle, than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God.

- 5. It's obvious that these are two different names for the same kingdom: God is in heaven and reigns from heaven; therefore it is called the kingdom of God and the kingdom of heaven.
 - A. If it was suspected that these were two different kingdoms, the fact that they are described *identically* in parallel passages demands that they are the same kingdom.
 - B. Things that are both equal to something are equal to each other.
