"Yet in the church I had rather speak five words with my understanding, that by my voice I might teach others also, than ten thousand words in an unknown tongue." (ICo 14:19)

- I. The Apostle Paul said that he would rather speak five words in the church with his understanding than 10,000 words in an unknown tongue (1Co 14:19).
 - 1. This got me to thinking of powerful and beautiful five-word phrases in scripture that say far more than a room full of babbling Charismatics.
 - 2. What follows are 10 such phrases and a short exposition of each one.
- II. "There is but one God..." (1Co 8:6)
 - 1. This profound fact separates Old Testament religion and Christianity from nearly every other religion in the world.
 - 2. The LORD Jehovah is one God (**Deut 6:4**).
 - 3. The "gods" of the nations are idols (Psa 96:5) and are no gods at all (2Ki 19:18; Gal 4:8).
- III. "In the beginning God created..." (Gen 1:1)
 - 1. This five-word phrase destroys the false doctrines of atheism, evolution, theistic evolution, and the big bang theory.
 - 2. This profound phrase declares that God is:
 - A. eternal God was present in the beginning before the universe existed.
 - B. infinitely powerful it takes infinite power to cause something to come from nothing.
 - C. infinitely intelligent it takes infinite intelligence to design and create our incredibly complex world.
 - D. sovereign whoever creates something has absolute control over it.
 - 3. The first five words of the Bible tell us that God is eternal, omnipotent, omniscient, and sovereign.
- IV. "Before Abraham was, I am..." (Joh 8:58)
 - 1. These five words prove that Jesus Christ is the eternal God.
 - 2. Jesus was claiming to have existed before Abraham who lived 2000 years before Him.
 - A. The only way this could be is if Jesus Christ is eternal.
 - B. Jesus' human nature was not eternal, but His divine nature is (Mic 5:2; Joh 1:1-3).
 - 3. Jesus was declaring that He was Jehovah when He said "I am" (Exo 3:14).
- V. "The Word was made flesh..." (Joh 1:14)
 - 1. These five words declare that God became a man.
 - 2. The Word is the second person of the Trinity (1Jo 5:7).

- 3. The Word (the divine nature) was joined to human flesh in the womb of the virgin Mary and became the Son of God (Luk 1:35).
- 4. Jesus Christ was God manifest in the flesh (1Ti 3:16).

VI. "He shall save His people..." (Mat 1:21)

- 1. These five words declare profound truth regarding soteriology.
- 2. Jesus is the Savior and none else (Act 4:12).
- 3. Jesus would (and did) certainly save particular men (2Ti 1:9; Heb 10:14).
- 4. Jesus saved those who were given to Him (Joh 6:39; Joh 17:2).

VII. "Christ died for our sins..." (1Co 15:3)

- 1. These five words declare the core of the gospel.
- 2. Jesus Christ was the perfect, sinless lamb of God who was sacrificed for our sins (1Pe 1:18-19; Joh 1:29).
- 3. He was made sin for us that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him (2Co 5:21).
- 4. He bore our sins in His own body to the cross so that we could live eternally (1Pe 2:24).

VIII. "Thy law is the truth." (Psa 119:142)

- 1. These five words reveal the one infallible source of truth in the universe.
- 2. God's word (the Bible) is truth (Joh 17:17).
- 3. "All thy commandments are truth." (Psa 119:151)
- 4. All of God's words are right, and there is nothing froward or perverse in them (Pro 8:8).
- 5. Every word of God is pure (Pro 30:5).

IX. "For the LORD giveth wisdom..." (Pro 2:6)

- 1. These five words tell us the origin of wisdom.
- 2. Wisdom comes from God (Exo 36:1).
- 3. God's wisdom is found in Jesus Christ, who is the wisdom of God (1Co 1:24).
- 4. God's wisdom is also found in His word (**Deut 4:5-6**).
- 5. God gives wisdom to those who truly desire it (Pro 2:1-5; Jam 1:5).

X. "Wisdom is the principal thing..." (Pro 4:7)

- 1. These five words tell us what should be our top priority in life.
- 2. Wisdom is the most important thing.
 - A. <u>Wisdom</u> *n.* 1. a. Capacity of judging rightly in matters relating to life and conduct; soundness of judgement in the choice of means and ends; sometimes, less strictly, sound sense, esp. in practical affairs: opp. to *folly*.
 - B. <u>Principal</u> *adj*. 1. First or highest in rank or importance; that is at the head of all the rest; of the greatest account or value; foremost: = *chief*
- 3. We should get wisdom with all of our getting (Pro 4:5-7).

XI. "Surely I come quickly. Amen." (Rev 22:20)

- 1. These five words declare that our Lord is going to return.
 - A. It will happen *surely*.

- B. When the time comes, it will happen quickly and suddenly (1Th 5:3).
- C. These are Jesus' final words to us.
- We should desire the second coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.
 A. We should be waiting eagerly for His return (1Th 1:10; Heb 9:28).
 B. "Even so, come, Lord Jesus." (Rev 22:20)
